One evening, eight Mennonite women climb into a hay loft to conduct a secret meeting. 'Half of our family, the better-looking half, is missing,' Nomi tells us at the beginning of *A Complicated Kindness*. Left alone with her father Ray, her days are spent piecing together the reasons her mother Trudie and her sister Tash have gone missing, and trying to figure out what she can do to avoid a career at Happy Family Farms, a chicken abattoir on the outskirts of East Village - not the neighbourhood in Manhattan where Nomi most wants to live but the small town in southern Manitoba. East Village is ministered by Hans, Nomi's pious uncle, otherwise known as The Mouth. As Nomi gets to the bottom of the truth behind her mother's and sister's disappearances, she

finds herself on a direct collision course with her uncle and the only community she has ever known. In this funny, compassionate and moving novel, Miriam Toews has created a character who will stay in the hearts of readers long after they've put the book down. "I have never, ever wanted to write an autobiography. The number of times I have been approached and every time I said no, no, it's a wank" Miriam Karlin is that rare creature: a pillar of the British acting establishment who is at the same time a thoroughgoing maverick. We adjust the lens, and another beautiful, yet different combination of color evolves. Then suddenly the kaleidoscope is thrust to face a black hole. No light means no beautiful display. When you timidly, maybe fearfully, tilt your kaleidoscope back toward the light, you'll see a new combination you've never seen before, colors you didn't know existed. Location and contrast create new and unexpected beauty. “ More than a “survival” book, *Where Do I go From Here* raises the bar in life after loss to include love, laughter, and adventure. This is a book about facing forward, not backwards. It is about purposely moving into a bolder and broader future. Includes practical help and chapter discussion questions for individual or group study. After her father took his own life in 1998, Miriam Toews decided to face her confusion and pain straight on. In writing her father's memoir, she was motivated by two primary goals: For her own sake, she needed to understand, or at least accept, her father's final decision. For her father's sake, she needed to honour him, to elucidate his life and to demonstrate its worth. Apart from its brief prologue and epilogue, *Swing Low* is written entirely from Mel Toews's perspective. Miriam Toews has her father tell his story from bed as he waits in a Steinbach hospital to be transferred to a psychiatric facility in Winnipeg. Mel turns to writing to make sense of his condition, to review his life in the hope of seeing it more clearly. He remembers himself as an anxious child, the son of a despondent father and an alcoholic mother, who never once made him feel loved. At seventeen he was diagnosed with manic depression (now known as bipolar disorder). His psychiatrist's predictions were grim: Mel shouldn't count on marrying, starting a family or holding down a job. With great courage and determination, Mel went on to do all three: he married his childhood sweetheart, had two happy daughters and was a highly respected and beloved teacher for forty years. Although Mel was able to keep his disorder hidden from the community, his family frequently witnessed his unravelling. Over the years this schism between his public and private life grew wider. An outgoing and tireless trailblazer at school, he often collapsed into silence and despair at home. Ironically, in trying to win his

family's love through hard work and accomplishments, he deprived them of what they yearned for most: his presence, his voice. Once he retired from teaching – "the daily ritual of stepping outside himself" – Mel lost his creative outlet and, with it, his hope. A pioneering force in the feminist art movement of the 1970s, Miriam Schapiro (b. 1923) dared to challenge the marginalized role of women in the art world by creating a visual vocabulary to express women's experiences. In this lavishly illustrated book, the first comprehensive monograph on the artist, acclaimed art historian Thalia Gouma-Peterson traces the trajectory of Schapiro's career over five decades, from her gestural canvases of the 1950s, to her self-exploratory "Shrines" and geometric abstractions of the 1960s, to her large-scale *femmagés* (feminist-oriented collages of paint and fabric) of the 1970s and 1980s, and



finally to her autobiographical figural compositions of the 1980s and 1990s. The book opens with an insightful foreword by Linda Nochlin, who was among the first scholars to recognize and teach feminist art history. She reflects on a significant 1973 article she wrote about Schapiro, which is reprinted in the book in its entirety. Schapiro was a founder, with Judy Chicago, of the Feminist Art Program at the California Institute of the Arts in the early 1970s, out of which came the groundbreaking collaborative installation *Womanhouse*, a full-scale feminist environment created in an abandoned house in Hollywood. This project marked the beginning of Schapiro's legendary collaborations with other women, who gave her samplers, doilies, tea towels, quilt squares -- "handicrafts" associated with women's conventional homemaking role -- to incorporate into her *femmes*. With her monumental heart-, fan-, and house-shaped canvases layered with pieces of fabric and paint, which reclaim forms and symbols traditionally trivialized as sentimental, feminine, and decorative, Schapiro helped launch the Pattern and Decoration movement of the 1970s and 1980s and developed a colorful and sensuous style that has influenced a generation of younger artists. Then there are Schapiro's "collaborations" across time and space, in which she appropriates the work of her female predecessors -- such as Mary Cassatt, Frida Kahlo, Sonia Delaunay, and Natalia Goncharova -- as a means to lay claim to a genealogy of women artists. Figural paintings on the themes of dance, performance, and masquerade are further explorations of self-identity in Schapiro's work. By piecing together fragments of her own autobiography with the experiences of other women to express a feminist vision, Schapiro, in the words of Gloria Steinem, has been "the rare woman who had a choice between acceptance and pioneering -- and who exercised it".
